Beverly's exhibit pays tribute to the positive influence that stewardship has had on the continued survival of both Mono Lake and the Bristlecone Pine. Her photographs will be on exhibit through July 9th, and all displayed work can be purchased directly from the Mono Lake Committee Information Center & Bookstore.
